Conversations on a Bench



It was a blustery day in October. A cold front passed through Salisbury the previous day, but it didn't dissuade the conversation from beginning. The wind and temperature set a fitting framework to discuss being hungry, cold and alone.

"Conversations on a Bench" was a national, 24-hour event where ministries shared real stories about homelessness, addiction and mental health. On October 9, the Shelter's Executive Director, Anthony Dickerson, bundled up for the outdoor weather and a 24-hour stint when he talked with local elected officials, nonprofit heads and leaders from the local faith community. The entire event was live-streamed on the Shelter's Facebook page, where everyone could follow conversations with 13 featured guests, including Salisbury mayor Randy Taylor, city councilwoman April Jackson, NAACP local president Monica Brooks and Maryland state delegate Sheree Sample-Hughes.

The event's reach and influence were impressive: during the 48-hour period which included the event, we saw more than 11,000 new page views on Facebook. There were hundreds of community engagements on our page which included comments, shares and reactions. Thirty new people became Facebook "followers." Other viewers responded with financial donations or commitments to join our "Covenant Partners" monthly donation program.

Nationwide, hundreds of events led to a better understanding of the problem and encouraged broader community involvement and support for local rescue missions. As is the case with most noble endeavors, God's work requires many hands.

A beautiful example of faith-filled art now graces a wall within the Shelter's "Respite Room." Local artist Jessica Schlegel offered her artistic talents by painting "Christ's Promise to the Children," an inspiring rendition of youth united in faith. Schlegel, who holds a master's degree in teaching, has been doing commission artwork for clients for six years. She's also painted public art in Ocean City and was voted "Best Artist" in Coastal Style magazine two years in a row. When she was a teacher at Beaver Run Elementary School, two co-workers (other teachers) suggested contacting the Shelter about painting a Jesus and children concept within our building. 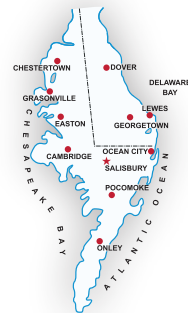

1. Breakfast meats (bacon, scrapple, ham, turkey, hot dogs).
Breakfast cereals in large box sizes.
2. Toilet Paper + Paper Towels.
3. Cold, Flu, Sore throat, Heartburn, and Headache remedies.
4. Bottled Waters (small & large sizes).
5. Small juices for kids lunches, sliced or unsliced lunch meats.
6. Bleach, Laundry Detergents, Dryer Sheets and Fabric Softeners.
7. Sliced Cheeses, Grated cheeses (for spaghetti meals).
8. Lysol Disinfecting Sprays/Wipes.
9. Non-Styrofoam, Paper Plates, Cups.
10. Baby care items: Wipes, Pampers, Skin care items.
11. Heavy cord (to tie up bundles of waste cardboard for recycling).
